

What's the outlook for our finances in 2025?

A 2024 is shaping up to be another year of substantial progress in our efforts to return our financial performance to something more in line with what we want and expect for Grace Church. Obviously, the year isn't over but at this point in late October, we are reasonably confident that if recent trends continue, we will end up close to the break-even that was forecast when the vestry approved the budget early last spring. As usual, reasons for this performance include the generosity of the parish, which is reflected in our annual stewardship program and throughout the year; the work of the clergy, wardens, vestry and staff in managing our expenses; and this year, in particular, the decision to cut back on the number of full-time clergy.

Looking ahead to 2025, the hope and expectation is that we can continue to do as well or better than we are this year without 2024's, one time adjustment in the number of full time clergy. Obviously, savings from this major step will continue but not the dramatic one-time effect recorded in 2024. As usual, achieving break-even results or hopefully something better in almost any church is never assured. With Grace, the generosity of our members can be assumed, but the demographics, like those of most parishes, continue to change and requires increased effort by the rest of us as older parishioners move on and younger parishioners replace them in numbers, but not yet in pledges. And on expenses, while the rate of increase in inflation appears to have slowed, the effects of recent past increases in prices continue to flow through and increase what we pay for everything from medical insurance to removing the snow from the parking lot. In our case, funds which we draw on a scheduled basis from our endowment, rental income from our tenants and fundraisers all help. But as we look ahead to the new financial year, it is support from parishioners through the process of stewardship that determines how we are able to set and meet our financial objectives in support of achieving our mission.

Q Doesn't the church get funding from outside sources, like the Diocese or charitable foundations? What about our endowment?

A The ministry of our parish is funded almost entirely by our members. Without the generosity of the people who support us, we could not have public worship, provide pastoral care, support outreach initiatives or care for our buildings. We give a portion of our money to the Diocese, to support the work of the Bishop and to assist mission parishes throughout the Diocese in much poorer areas whose ministries feed the hungry and proclaim the Good News of Jesus. Your pledge money supports both the Grace community and other communities which need help. We are indeed blessed with an endowment. Even with this endowment, we are very disciplined about living within our means and not drawing on the endowment beyond specified limits that are designed to preserve these funds for future parish needs.

Q I like to give money in the offering plate—instead of pledging. Isn't that the same thing?

A pledge gives Grace the ability to plan for the year. Gifts in the plate are received with gratitude and used for our mission, but cannot be included in budget planning if they are unknown. Envelopes can be provided for any who prefer to place their weekly offering or pledge in the plate.

Q Does all the money go to Jesus? Really?

A Yes! We promise! We take seriously the fact that we are Christ's Body here in Madison. And Jesus promised that when we serve the vulnerable and care for one another we are actually caring for Jesus. Everything we do, we do for God's glory and to serve God's people. Every time the choir sings, or the Sunday School students learn a new Bible story, or our priests visit the hospital, or Altar Guild buys silver polish for the communion vessels, we know that we are serving the Living God who is among us. So, we really do promise, every cent you give is for Jesus!

Q When do you need my pledge card back? Does it need to come in the mail?

A You can pledge online, email your pledge amount, or return your pledge card to the office. The sooner we get your pledge commitment, the sooner we can plan our budget for the coming year.

Q So, if I send in my pledge, do you need the payment today?

A Nope! The card helps us know what you plan to give for the coming year, so we can plan our ministry for the coming year. People fulfill their pledges on whatever timetable works for their own budget and finances. You can pay today, if that makes your life easier, but we aren't looking for money today, just your intentions for giving.

Q Can I pay electronically?

A Absolutely! Our website offers the ability to make pledges and payments on a secure platform. Visit www.gracemadison.org/giving.

Q This is such a wealthy area. Do you really need help from all members?

A We surely do! This is indeed an affluent part of the country. Some of us are very comfortable. Some of us barely get by. And most of us are somewhere in between. Our goal is a pledge from every member, in part because we who do pledge have come to know great joy in giving our resources to support this parish. It's a wonderful feeling to see our money support God's creative work! Each gift is dear to us, because it represents the faithfulness of a member who shares our belief that we are called to be generous and invited to share. Simply put, we need every pledge to continue to do the work God has given us to do.
